Michael S. Barr is Professor of Law at the University of Michigan Law School, where he teaches Financial Institutions, International Finance, Jurisdiction and Choice of Law, Transnational Law, and Finance and Development. Barr is also a nonresident Senior Fellow at the Brookings Institution in Washington, D.C.

Barr is currently engaged in a large-scale survey of low- and moderate-income households about financial services as the Faculty Investigator for the Detroit Area Household Financial Services Study, being conducted with the Institute for Social Research at the University of Michigan.

Sherraden), in BUILDING ASSETS, BUILDING CREDIT: CREATING WEALTH IN LOW-INCOME COMMUNITIES (N. Retsinas and E. Belsky, eds., Brookings Press, 2005); *Banking the Poor*, 21 YALE JOURNAL ON REGULATION 121 (2004); and *Microfinance and Financial Development*, 26 MICHIGAN JOURNAL OF INTERNATIONAL LAW 271 (2004).

Barr recently co-organized the World Bank's conference "Access to Finance: Building Inclusive Financial Systems," and is co-editor (with Anjali Kumar and Bob Litan) of a forthcoming Brookings Press volume based on the conference.

Barr served in senior positions in the U.S. government from 1994 to 2001: Special Adviser and Counselor on the Policy Planning Staff of the State Department, Treasury Secretary Robert E. Rubin's Special Assistant, Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Treasury for Community Development Policy, and Special Adviser to President William J. Clinton. Barr helped to develop and enact over \$25 billion in initiatives to expand access to capital and financial services for low- and moderate-income communities.

He earned a B.A., *summa cum laude*, with Honors in History, from Yale University, an M. Phil. in International Relations from Oxford University, as a Rhodes Scholar, and a J.D. from Yale Law School. Barr clerked for then-District Court Judge Pierre N. Leval in New York, and for Justice David H. Souter of the U.S. Supreme Court.
