

William Easterly

William Easterly is a Nonresident Senior Fellow in Global Economy and Development at the Brookings Institution and a Professor of Economics at New York University, joint with Africa House, and Co-Director of NYU's Development Research Institute.



William Easterly received his Ph.D. in Economics at MIT. He spent sixteen years as a Research Economist at the World Bank. He is the author of *The White Man's Burden: How the West's Efforts to Aid the Rest Have Done So Much Ill and So Little Good* (Penguin, 2006), *The Elusive Quest for Growth: Economists' Adventures and Misadventures in the Tropics* (MIT, 2001), three other co-edited books, and 54 articles in refereed economics journals.

His work has been discussed in media outlets like the Lehrer Newshour, National Public Radio, the BBC, the *New York Times*, *Wall Street Journal*, *Washington Post*, the *Economist*, the *New Yorker*, *Forbes*, *Business Week*, the *Financial Times*, the *Times of London*, the *Guardian*, and the *Christian Science Monitor*.

Easterly's areas of expertise are the determinants of long-run economic growth and the effectiveness of foreign aid. He has worked in most areas of the developing world, most heavily in Africa, Latin America, and Russia. Easterly is an associate editor of the *Quarterly Journal of Economics*, the *Journal of Economic Growth*, and of the *Journal of Development Economics*. He was born in West Virginia and grew up in Bowling Green, Ohio.
