Leonardo Martinez-Diaz is Fellow and Deputy Director of the Global Economy and Development Program.

Martinez-Diaz's areas of expertise include the governance of international financial institutions (especially the World Bank and the IMF), the regulation of banking and financial institutions, and the nexus between politics and economic development in developing countries, with a focus on Mexico, Indonesia, and Brazil.



He has served as Director of the High-Level Commission on the Modernization of World Bank Group Governance, an advisory group tasked by World Bank President Robert Zoellick with producing recommendations to strengthen the governance of that institution. Martinez-Diaz has also served as consultant to the Independent Evaluation Office of the International Monetary Fund and was Deputy Director of Brookings' Partnership for the Americas Commission, a high-level advisory group on U.S. policy toward Latin America.

Martinez-Diaz received masters and doctoral degrees in International Relations from Oxford University, where he was a Truman and Marshall Scholar. He graduated with honors from Northwestern University with degrees in Economics and Political Science. As a Luce Scholar, he lived and worked in Indonesia for two years.
