

John M. Page

John Page is a Senior Fellow in the Global Economy and Development Program at the Brookings Institution in Washington, DC. He is also affiliated with the International Growth Centre, Oxford and an advisor to the African Development Bank.



From 1980 to 2008 he was a World Bank economist and manager, undertaking a wide range of research, policy and operational assignments, including Director, Poverty Reduction, Director, Economic Policy, and Chief Economist for the Middle East and North Africa. He was the Chief Economist for the Africa Region of the World Bank from 2004 to 2008.

Prior to his appointment at the World Bank, Dr. Page was a member of the faculty at Stanford and Princeton Universities. From 1996 to 2006 he was Adjunct Professor at the Paul Nitze School of Advanced International Studies, Johns Hopkins University. In 2008 he was Visiting Professor at the National Graduate Institute for Policy Studies, Tokyo, Japan. Currently, he is a Senior Associate Member of St. Anthony's College and Research Associate, Center for the Study of African Economies at Oxford University.

Dr. Page has been a consultant to the Global Development Network, the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA), the United Nations Industrial Development Program (UNIDO), and the World Bank. He has served on the Boards of Directors of the Africa Economic Research Consortium and the Economic Research Forum for the Arab Countries, Iran and Turkey.

John Page received his Bachelors degree in economics from Stanford University and his Doctorate from Oxford University, where he was a Rhodes Scholar. He has published several books, including *The East Asian Miracle: Economic Growth and Public Policy* (Oxford: 1993) and *Africa at a Turning Point? Growth, Aid and External Shocks* (World Bank: 2008). He is the author of more than seventy five published papers on the economics of developing countries.
