



LEX RIEFFEL



Lex Rieffel is a Non-Resident Senior Fellow at The Brookings Institution. He is currently working on a policy study of the off-budget funding of the military in Indonesia. His essay on the remarkable political and economic transitions in Indonesia in 2004 was published in the September-October 2004 issue of *Foreign Affairs*. He joined Brookings in February 2002 to write a book: "Sovereign Debt Restructuring: the Case for Ad Hoc Machinery" (Brookings Institution Press, September 2003). In December 2003, his policy brief on "Reconsidering the Peace Corps" was published by Brookings. Following up on this work, he founded the "Brookings Initiative on International Volunteering and Service" in 2006 and published a second policy brief on this subject. In 2005, he published policy briefs on the Millennium Challenge Corporation and Nigeria's Paris Club debt problem. Mr. Rieffel teaches a graduate course on "Financial Issues in Emerging Market Countries" at the Elliott School of International Affairs, George Washington University. Between the beginning of 2001 and April 2003, he completed four one-month assignments advising the Government of Indonesia on a several international financial policy issues.

From April 1994 to June 2001 Mr. Rieffel was employed by the Institute of International Finance as Senior Advisor and Director of the Multilateral Policy Department. Immediately prior to joining the IIF, he was a Visiting Scholar at The Brookings Institution and an Adjunct Professor at the Nitze School of Advanced International Studies, Johns Hopkins University. From 1975 to 1992, he served on the international staff of the U.S. Treasury Department. His final assignment was directing the Office of Eastern Europe and Former Soviet Union Policy. Earlier, he directed the Office of Debt Policy, and had external assignments with the offices of the U.S. Ambassador to the OECD and the U.S. Executive Director of the IMF.

Mr. Rieffel was an economist with the U.S. Agency for International Development in Indonesia (1971-1973), a planning analyst at the International Paper Company (New York City), a volunteer with the U.S. Peace Corps (India), and an officer in the U.S. Navy (Vietnam). He is a graduate of Princeton University (B.A., Economics) and the Fletcher School, Tufts University (M.A.L.D., International Development Studies). His other publications include an award-winning essay on exchange controls in developing countries.
