She is the author of “Restoring Prosperity: The State Role in Revitalizing America’s Older Industrial Cities,” “Organizing for Success: A Call to Action for the Kansas City Region” and “Higher Education in Pennsylvania: A Competitive Asset for Communities.” She has co-authored several other Brookings publications, including “Back to Prosperity: A Competitive Agenda for Renewing Pennsylvania,” “Demographic Change in Medium-Sized Cities: Evidence from the 2000 Census,” and “Seizing City Assets: Ten Steps to Urban Land Reform.” Jennifer also co-edited *Retooling for Growth: Building a 21st Century Economy in America’s Older Industrial Areas*, published by the American Assembly and Brookings Institution Press.
