Benjamin Wittes is a Fellow and Research Director in Public Law at the Brookings Institution. He is the author of *Law and the Long War: The Future of Justice in the Age of Terror*, forthcoming in June 2008 from The Penguin Press. His previous books include *Starr: A Reassessment*, which was published in 2002 by Yale University Press, and *Confirmation Wars: Preserving Independent Courts in Angry Times*, published in 2006 by Rowman & Littlefield and the Hoover Institution. He is a columnist for *The New Republic Online* and a contributing editor for *The Atlantic Monthly*.



Between 1997 and 2006, he served as an editorial writer for *The Washington Post* specializing in legal affairs. Before joining the editorial page staff of *The Washington Post*, Wittes covered the Justice Department and federal regulatory agencies as a reporter and news editor at *Legal Times*. His writing has also appeared in a wide range of journals and magazines, including *Slate*, *The New Republic*, *The Wilson Quarterly*, *The Weekly Standard*, *Policy Review*, and *First Things*.
