Robert E. Lang is a nonresident senior fellow at Brookings and co-director of Brookings Mountain West. Lang is also a professor of sociology at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas, director of The Lincy Institute, an editor of the new scholarly publication *Opolis: An International Journal of Suburban and Metropolitan Studies* and an associate editor of the journals *Housing Policy Debate* and the *Journal of the American Planning Association*.

In 2006, he was a visiting distinguished professor at Arizona State University. He is currently a fellow of the Urban Land Institute. Lang is also a planning and development fellow of the Lincoln Institute of Land Policy and a visiting fellow of the University of California. Prior to joining Virginia Tech, Lang was director of Urban and Metropolitan Research at the Fannie Mae Foundation in Washington, DC.

Lang received a Ph.D. in Urban Sociology from Rutgers University, where he also taught sociology and urban studies. He was a research associate at the Center for Urban Policy Research at Rutgers University. Lang's research specialties include, suburban studies, demographic and spatial analysis, housing and the built environment, and metropolitan governance. He has authored over 100 academic and professional publications on a wide range of topics, and has developed many new urban planning concepts such as "Boomburbs," "Edgeless Cities," and "Megapolitan Areas."

Lang's research has been featured in the *USA Today*, *New York Times*, *Washington Post*, *Wall Street Journal*, *US News and World Report* and reported on by *NPR*, *CNN*, *MSNBC*, and *ABC World News Tonight*. Lang's latest work includes the book *Edgeless Cities: Exploring the Elusive Metropolis*, which is published by the Brookings Institution Press. He is also co-author of three edited volumes on the census titled *Redefining Urban and Suburban America: Evidence from Census 2000*, also by the Brookings Institution Press. Lang also authored a book titled *Boomburbs: the Rise of America's Accidental Cities*.
