Justin Wolfers is a non-resident senior fellow of the Brookings Institution, co-editor of the Brookings Papers on Economic Activity, and an associate professor of economics in the Business and Public Policy Department at the Wharton School.



Wolfers is also a visiting scholar with the San Francisco Federal Reserve; a Research Associate with the National Bureau of Economic Research; a Research Fellow with the Institute for the Study of Labor (IZA) in Bonn; a Research Affiliate with the Centre for Economic Policy Research in London; an International Research Fellow with the Kiel Institute for the World Economy, and a Fellow of the CESifo, in Munich.

He was previously an Assistant Professor at Stanford's Graduate School of Business, and an economist with the Reserve Bank of Australia. Dr. Wolfers earned his Ph.D. in economics in June 2001 from Harvard University, and was a Fulbright, Knox and Menzies Scholar. He earned his undergraduate degree in Economics his native Australia at the University of Sydney in 1994, winning the University Medal.

Professor Wolfers' research focuses on labor economics, macroeconomics, law and economics, social policy and behavioral economics. Beyond research, he is a popular MBA teacher, a contributor to the New York Times' Freakonomics blog, an occasional editorialist, and is a frequent contributor to the public debate.
