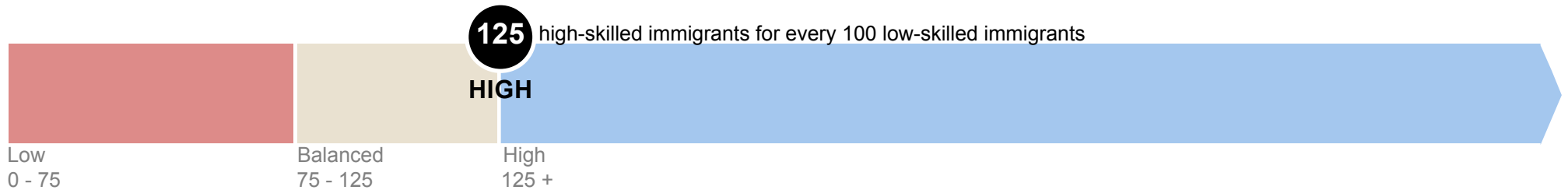

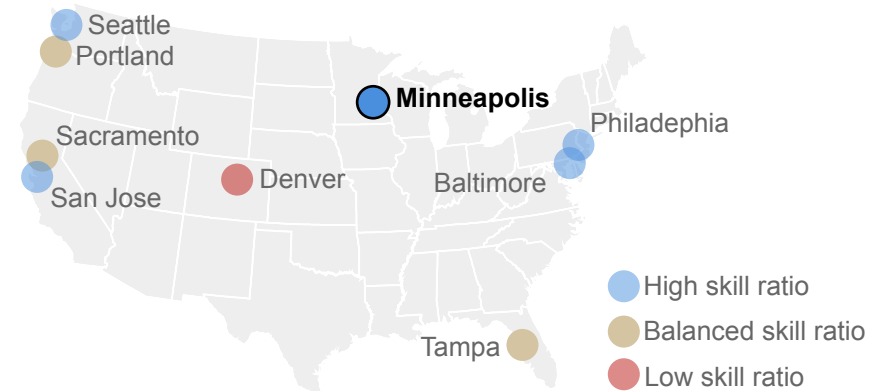
Immigrant gateway type

Re-emerging gateways had an early 20th century settlement pattern very similar to the Former gateways, attracting immigrants in great numbers in the early part of the 20th century before experiencing low levels of immigration for the duration. In a reversal, they saw fast immigrant growth at the tail end of the 20th century and into the last decade, raising their profiles as immigrant gateways.
