High-Tech Cities -- Compared to Low-Tech

- More interested in other places/cultures
- More likely to 'try anything once'
- More likely to engage in individualistic activities
- More optimistic
- Volunteering increasing less than in low-tech cities
- Church attendance decreasing
- Club membership decreasing
- Community projects decreasing

Low-Tech Cities -- Compared to High-Tech

- More likely to attend church
- More family oriented
- More supportive of traditional authority
- More social activities with other people
- Volunteering increasing
- Church attendance increasing
- Club membership decreasing, but less so than in high-tech cities
- Community projects increasing
- More feelings of isolation and economic vulnerability
