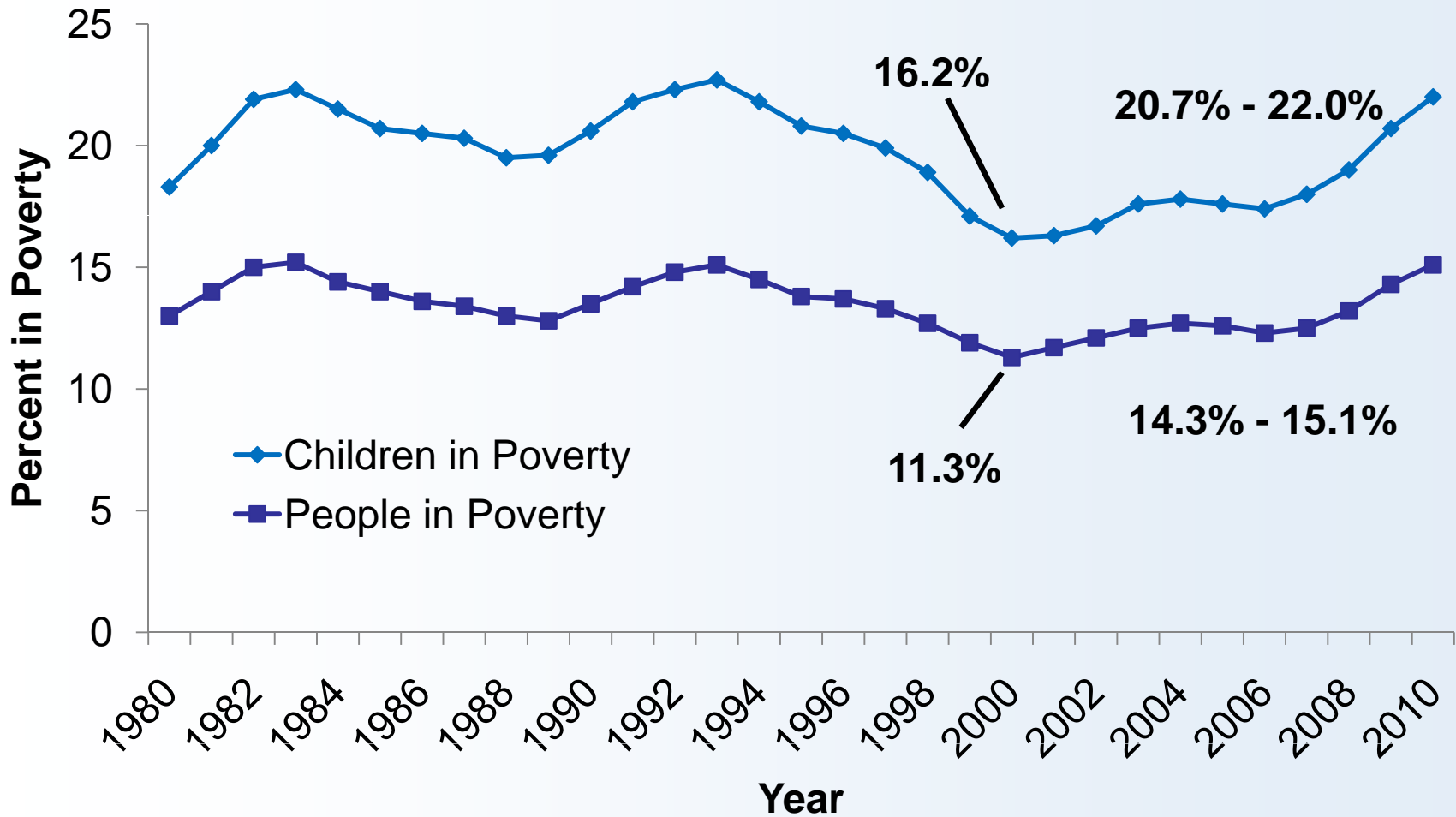

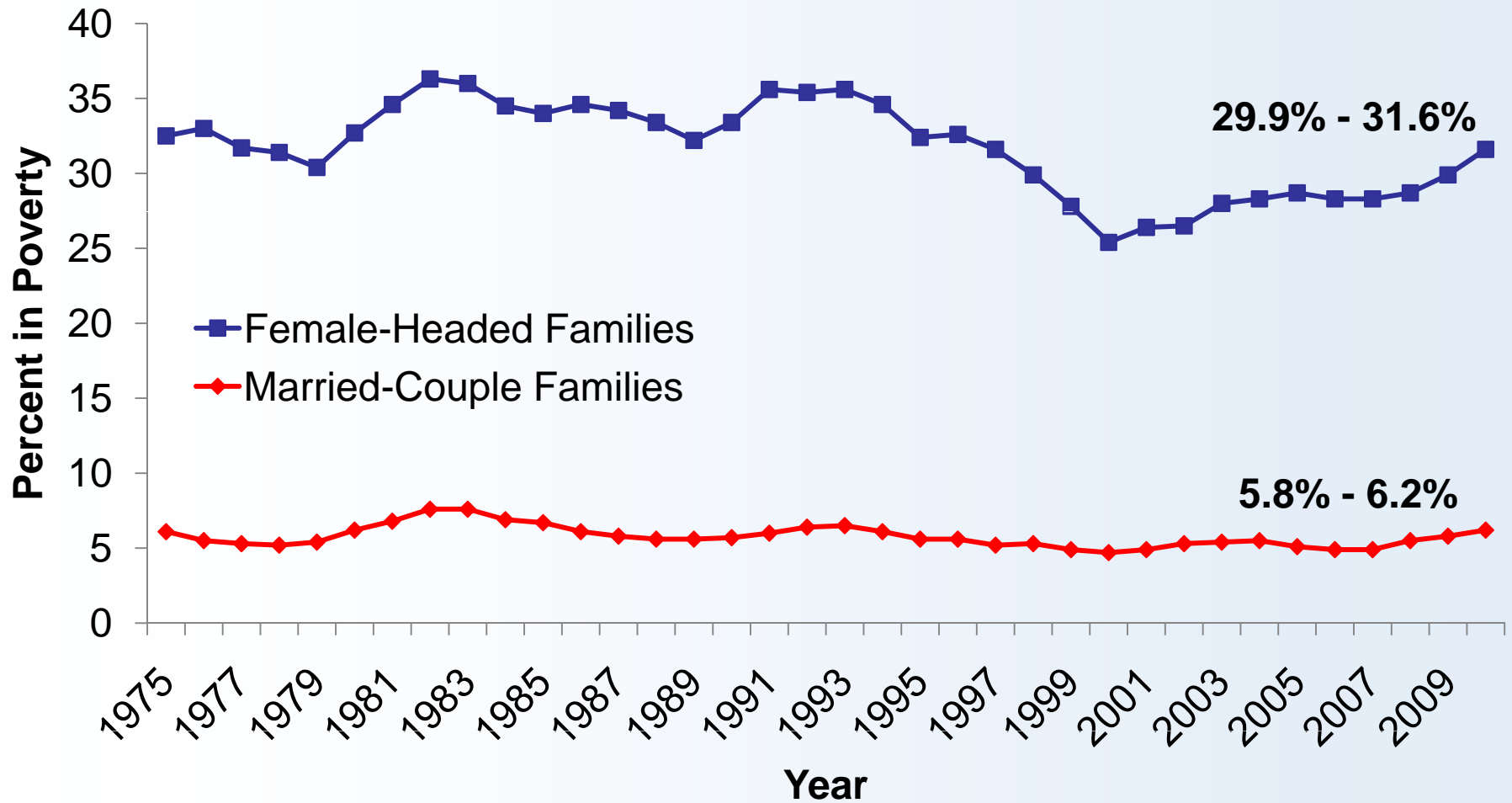

Children in Poverty and People in Poverty, 1980-2010



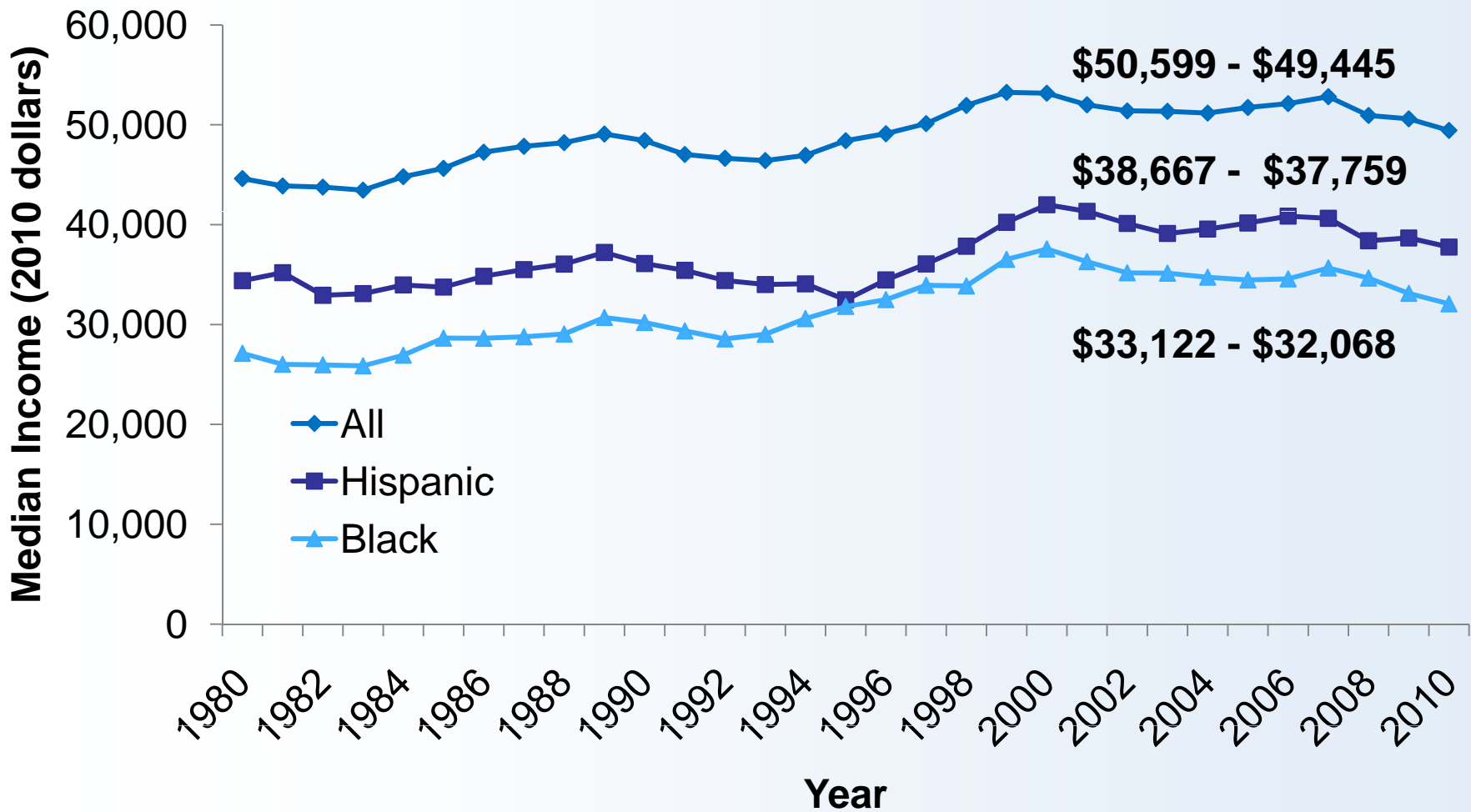

Poverty Rates for Children in Female-Headed and Married-Couple Families, 1975-2010



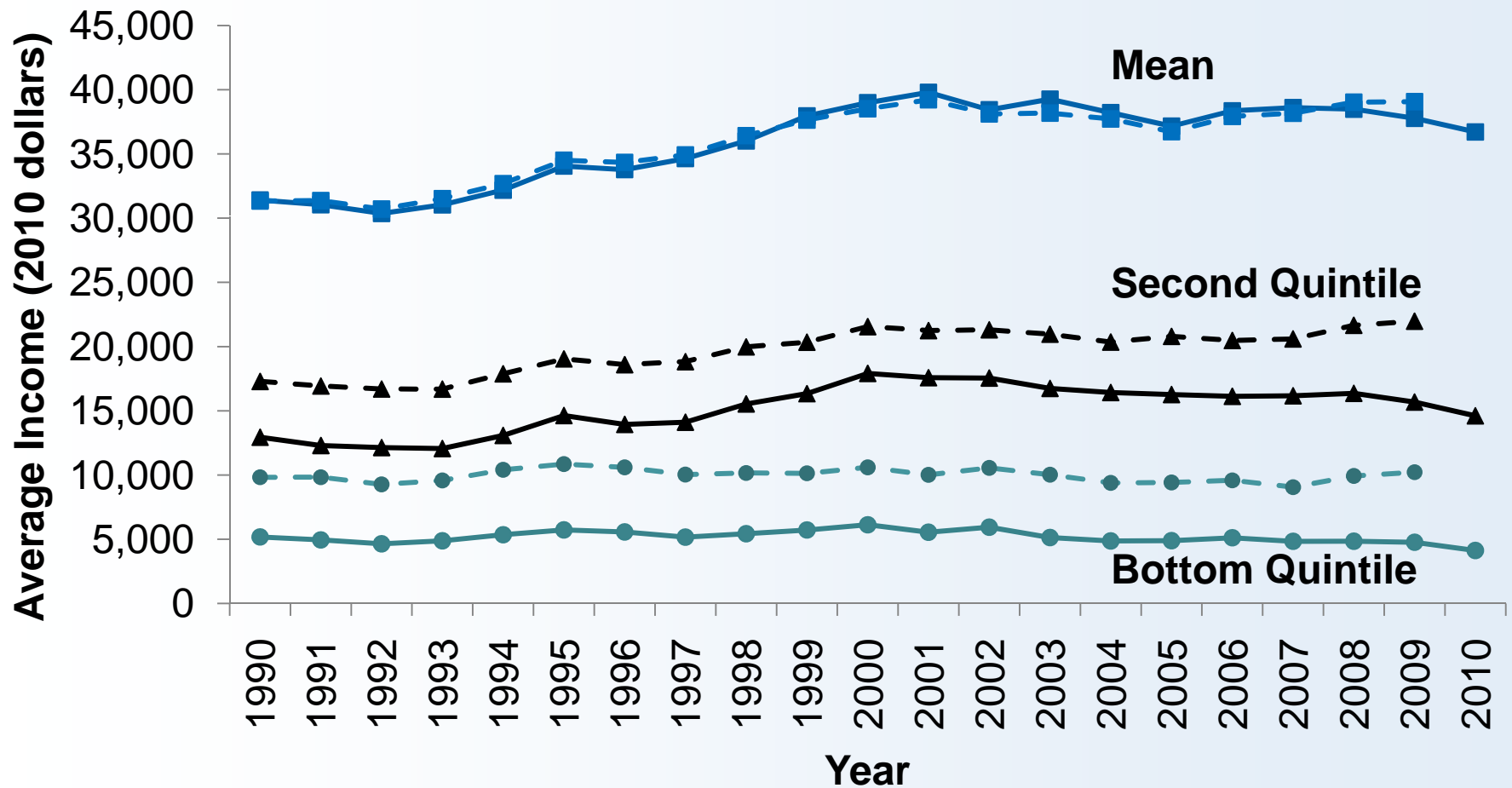

Median Income for All, Hispanic, and Black Households, 1980 – 2010



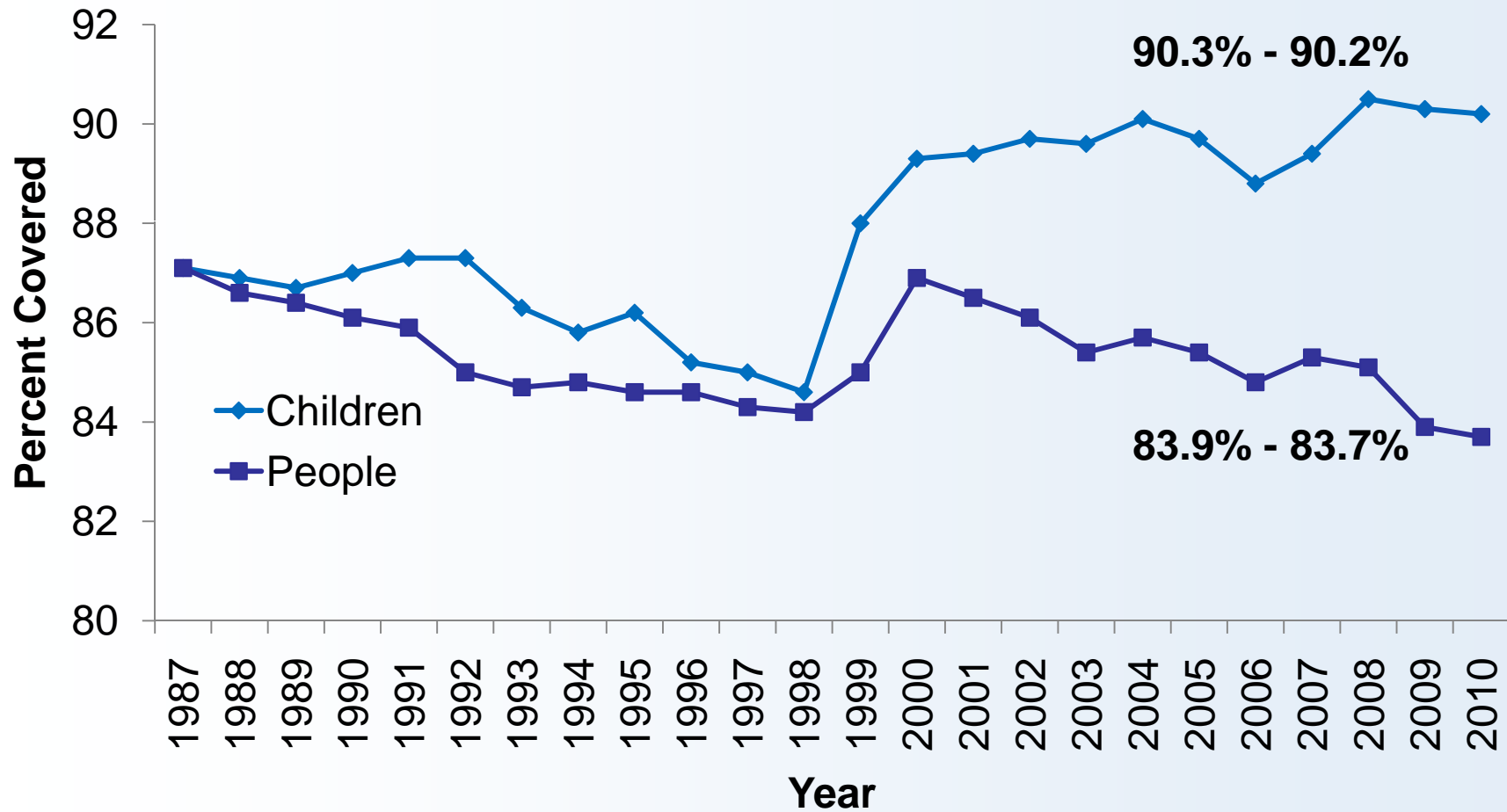

Income of Female-Headed Families with Children, 1990-2010



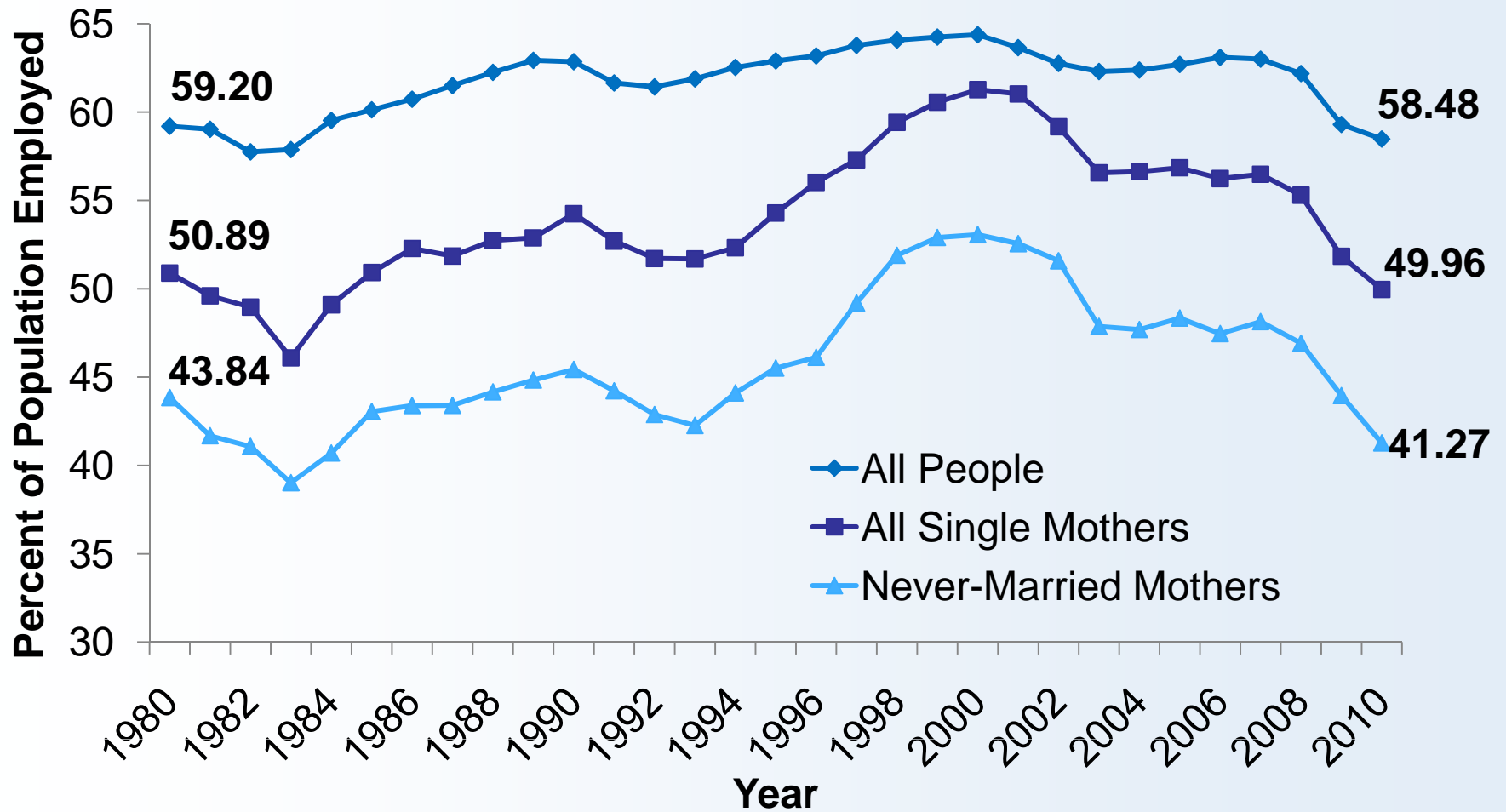
