Five state region grew by 19 percent from 2000 to 2007

Captured 14 percent of the nation's growth



By 2030, the Intermountain West will gain another 13 percent of the nation's growth

About "Mountain Megas"

Introduces the concept of "megapolitan" areas, applied to the West

Analyzes growth trends, challenges, and opportunities in this light

Advances a vision of a new federal-mega partnership that addresses necessary federal reforms while empowering rising megas of the West



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We identified five megapolitan areas in the Intermountain West



As a group, the Mountain megas represent fourfifths of the five states' population



The Mountain megas grew far faster than the national average

...and captured 13 percent of the nation's growth from 2000 to 2007



The Mountain megas are highly bounded, often by public land





Fully **86 percent** of Mountain mega residents live at urban densities



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Given their newness, the Mountain megas are undersupplied with Interstates
