#### ADMINISTRATIVE EXPERIENCE:

##### Significant Achievements during Ford School Deanship:

- **Academic Programs:** Launched the School’s first undergraduate degree program, expanding the student body by 60% and integrating new students and alumni into the community. Oversaw a curriculum review of the thriving B.A. program during its tenth year, enriching core and elective offerings. Led the first M.P.P. curriculum review in 18 years, which clarified learning objectives, updated core requirements, expanded experiential learning opportunities and strengthened skills-based instruction such as in writing.
- **Alumni:** Crafted an innovative, team-based Alumni Relations approach that led to one in four of our known alumni engaging with the school during the 2016 academic year – through career services, donations, events, student recruitment, and more.
- **Diversity, Equity & Inclusion (DEI):** Received recognition by the University for having the most diverse graduate program on campus for the academic years 2015, 2016 and 2017 – a testament to extensive, on-going work with faculty, students, staff and others. Milestones included the 2016 launch of a 5-year DEI strategic plan (encompassing who we are, what and how we teach, our climate, our research & policy engagement and outreach); Hiring the School’s first Diversity Officer; Showcasing the faculty’s extensive DEI scholarship; and the 35<sup>th</sup> anniversary of a successful, intensive summer pipeline program (PPIA).
- **Faculty Recruitment, Retention & Development:** Strengthened faculty through 16 new hires (46% of the tenured/tenure-track faculty as of July 2017) that broadened the disciplinary mix, enhanced the cross-campus network and added gender and ethnic diversity. Successfully retained eight T/TT faculty (44% of those previously hired). Implemented the first formal junior faculty mentoring program.
- **Fundraising and Budget:** Launched the Ford School’s (\$23M) portion of the ‘Victors for Michigan’ campaign. Expanded and invigorated the donor base and Dean’s Advisory Committee, deepened the gifts pipeline and raised over \$20M by July 2017. Annual endowment distributions grew more than 70%. Major gifts included student fellowships and internships, global engagement programming, endowed lecture series and faculty research support. (By campaign end, the School had far exceeded its campaign goal.)
- **Global Engagement:** Significantly expanded opportunities and funding for students to engage abroad

through internships and study-travel courses -- including introduction of the first such course for undergraduates, and creation of a new annual graduate course on China. Initiated a new joint degree program with INCAE in Costa Rica.

- **Governance & Staffing:** Restructured and strengthened the School's leadership team, including a new Associate Dean for Research & Policy Engagement. Introduced an annual staff climate survey. (83% positive or highly positive responses, on average, to 32 questions.)
- **Visibility:** Significantly raised the School's profile across the University of Michigan community and among external policy audiences. Strategic initiatives included: Crafting and implementing a multi-pronged 100 year celebration of public policy at Michigan; Showcasing faculty's public engagement; Faculty media training; Launching a distinguished speaker series that regularly brings diverse policy leaders to campus with live-streamed public events. Tracking and publicizing relevant metrics – media mentions quadrupled.
