North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA)	Obama not in office in 1993. "Obama believes that NAFTA and its potential were oversold to the American people. Obama will work with the leaders of Canada and Mexico to fix NAFTA so that it works for American workers." — BarackObama.com Read more	Voted in favor of NAFTA (1993) "objective statistics show that trade with Canada, trade with Mexico, has been good for our economy as well as theirs." — ABCNews.com Read more
China	Voted in Favor of Sen. Schumer's Chinese Currency Bill (2005) Obama not in office in 2000. Senator Obama "believes that China is manipulating its currency. He has pledged as President to use all the diplomatic avenues open to him to seek change in China's currency practices. Senator Obama also believes we need more sustained and serious efforts to combat intellectual property piracy in China. With respect to China trade, as more generally, he believes we must devote more resources to enforcing US rights and ensure that US trade laws are vigorously enforced." — WSJ.com Read more	Voted Against Sen. Schumer's Chinese Currency Bill (2005) Voted in Favor of Permanent Normal Trade Relations with China (2000) "the United States has benefited from trade with China, but there is plenty of work to do. China must be held to account when it violates rules and it must continue to appreciate its currency to a point where it reflects market forces. John McCain will not make the mistake, however, of reducing the relationship with China to the trade balance or the value of the renminbi. China needs to improve its record on human rights, do its share to fight global warming, be responsible in Africa, and help address the challenges of North Korea and Iran." — WSJ.com Read more
