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African immigrants in the Washington region: a demographic overview

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A few words about the data

Census defines foreign-born population as all persons born abroad who were not US citizens at birth. The data I present are for those born in Africa, so their US-born children are not included in these numbers.

Census does not ask about immigration status.

Data include legal permanent residents, temporary migrants (e.g. students), refugees and asylum seekers, and undocumented.



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Characteristics of African immigrants


Africans are a part of the "new immigration" that has taken place since 1965.

Total Foreign Born and Share Foreign Born in the United States, 1900-2008



Africans make up 4 % of all immigrants, up from 3% in 2000. 1.4 million African immigrants were counted in 2008.

Region of birth For the foreignborn population in the U.S., 2008




Number of Africans admitted as immigrants in 2008 is four times what it was in 1989.

Settlement patterns within the U.S.

Africans are scattered throughout the country, with the largest concentrations near big cities and in the Northeast.

Thirty-six percent of African immigrants live in 4 states, which each have more than 100,000 Africans: New York, California, Texas, and Maryland. No state has fewer than 200.

Minnesota, Maryland, and DC have the highest proportion of their immigrants from Africa.

Washington is a major destination for African immigrants.

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




Characteristics of African immigrants




Africans make up 14 percent of immigrants in the Washington metro area, compared to just 4 percent of immigrants in the U.S. and up from 11 percent in 2000.

Region of origin for the foreign-born population, Washington metropolitan area, 2008




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The immigrant population in the Washington region is diverse and no one nationality has a majority; Ethiopia ranks ninth.




West Africa is the largest region of origin, but Ethiopia is the largest single origin country represented in Washington.

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One quarter of Prince George's County's immigrants are from Africa. Alexandria, VA (not shown) also has high proportions.



Review of findings on African immigration

Africans are immigrating to the U.S. in increasing numbers and are the fastest-growing region of origin.

The Washington metro area is a major destination for Africans, with many settling in DC and the inner suburbs of Maryland and Virginia.

Ethiopians, Nigerians, and Ghanaians are the largest sending countries for Africans in Washington.

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
