A Word about the Data


■ Census 2000

- Foreign-born defined as all persons born outside the U.S.
- Does not ask about immigration status
- Includes legal permanent residents, temporary migrants (e.g. students), refugees and asylum seekers, and undocumented migrants


Figure 1: Total Foreign Born and Share Foreign Born in the United States, 1900-2000




U.S. Foreign-born Population




Number of Africans in the U.S. is Increasing

by Period of Entry, Census 2000






U.S. Settlement Patterns

- Africans are scattered throughout the country
- The largest concentrations are near large cities and in the Northeast
- Forty percent of Africans live in just four states: New York, California, Texas, and Maryland
- No state has fewer than 150 Africans
- DC, Maryland, and Rhode Island have the highest proportions of Africans




U.S. Settlement Patterns



Africans are highly urbanized

- 95% of the African-born were living in a metropolitan area in 2000.
- Almost one-half lived in just ten metro areas.









Region of Origin for Foreign Born in Washington



- Census 2000 counted 93,271 Africans in metro Washington.
- Africans comprise eleven percent of the foreign-born population in the region, compared to only 3% nationwide.


Region of Origin for Africans in Washington





Top African Countries of Origin in Washington





Distribution of Africans in Inner Washington by Zip Code, Census 2000


