Research drew on several distinct literatures, and was informed by extensive interview-based fieldwork, translations, and quantitative analysis of Islamist party membership data. The dissertation addressed a notable gap in the literature on Pakistani politics, but also provided wider insights for academics and policymakers regarding the ways in which religious parties contribute to both stability and instability.
