### Who are bisexual people?


#### People who identify as bisexual!

Our advocacy work builds off of self-identification


Bi ≠ 2

bisexual | queer | pansexual | +




#### Bi+ women are less likely than lesbians to be currently working





#### More bi+ women than lesbians were caregivers for minor children





#### Bi+ women report poorer health outcomes than their monosexual peers

	BI+ women	Lesbians	Straight women	BI+ men	Gay men	Straight men
Number of days of poor physical health in the past 30 days	5.5	4.8	3.4	8.3	3.7	3.5
Poor physical health inhibited usual activities	66%	43%*	36%*	44%	35%	34%
Number of days of poor mental health in the past 30 days	10.0	4.5*	3.2*	6.4	3.9	2.1*
Postponed or did not get needed medical care to avoid discrimination	10%	4%	3%	6%	2%	4%





### Bi+ women are more likely than their monosexual peers to use public benefits Women Men






#### Bi+ men experience poverty at a higher rate than straight men






# Gay and lesbian respondents report higher levels of discrimination based on sexual orientation than the bi+ peers

...but they can still experience


## felt stigma

such as feelings of shame or isolation






# White bi+ respondents are significantly more likely to be caregivers for minor children than lesbian or gay respondents of the same race, unlike bi+ respondents of color







# Bi+ respondents of color did not report significant differences in physical health outcomes compared with their monosexual peers, unlike white bi+ respondents
