**FORMAT OF THE CONVENING**

**Methodology.** We will apply the SDG Leadership Cities convening methodology to create a frank and honest exchange and to surface tools and approaches on sustainable recovery. We consider you the experts: as per our usual practice, we will rely upon your experiences, innovations, and challenges to drive the content for our meeting, with the sessions strongly participatory.

The key objective remains to provide a platform for direct city-to-city discussion and information-sharing on novel practices and tactics. Our intent is to provide an opportunity to take a step back from day-to-day management and share ideas with your peers about the challenges and future of your city. We are cognizant that the time spent with us is taken from your daily job or personal time and seek to maximize the value of this exchange as well as offer time for personal interactions.

As such, we will conduct the gathering similar to our past meetings of the SDG Leadership Cities, with sessions in roundtable format, their topics explored in highly interactive sessions designed to promote exchange that surfaces your best practices, innovations, and challenges. We also seek to facilitate and build relationships that provide opportunities for continued engagement that persists long after the meeting itself. Sessions are held under the Chatham House Rule to encourage candid discussions between peers and enable collective problem-solving with frank and honest assessments of limits, challenges, and obstacles as part of the discussion.

**Social Time and DC Networking.** During the meeting, there will be ample opportunities for discussions in small groups, and there will be the opportunity for social interaction each day. The agenda also seeks to leverage your presence in a city that hosts many key international development organizations as well as the foreign policy and diplomatic community. In-person attendees will have the opportunity to participate in sessions that bring in experts from external organizations as well as a networking evening with the DC diplomatic community hosted by Meridian International.

**Virtual Attendance.** We understand that some participants will join this convening virtually only. We have organized the agenda in a way that ensures all SDG Leadership Cities participants can attend the full substantive program, interact with their peers, and participate in the conversation.

SDG leadership is a team effort, so in addition to hosting invitees in person, we invite each city to have one additional person participate via video. A zoom link will be provided.

The long-term horizon of the SDGs poses a challenge to any elected government since their achievement depends on sustained efforts across multiple election cycles. As cities seek to consolidate and institutionalize longer-term commitments to the SDGs, several common approaches are beginning to emerge.
