





Plurals Are the First "Majority-Minority" Generation in US History



• Nearly half of Plurals (42%) and a quarter of Millennials (26%) say they can speak a language other than English well enough to hold a conversation compared with about one in ten Boomers (12%) and members of the Silent generation (10%).


Plurals are the Least Religious and Least Christian Generation in US History


Plurals and Millennials Prefer to Use Digital to Get News and Trust it More as a News Source


America's Youngest Generations Voted

Overwhelmingly Democratic for Congress in the 2022 Midterm Elections





The 2022 Democratic Advantage Among Young Voters in Battleground States Allowed the Democrats to Recapture Senate Control





Gender Gap Has Disappeared Among Plurals and Millennial White Voters





No Gender Gap Among African-Americans





Gender Gap Has Disappeared Among Plural and Millennial Hispanics



Younger and Older Republicans Diverge Significantly on Social Issues, Democrats Broadly United



Millennials and Plurals Solidly Support Keeping Abortion Legal Across Gender, Ethnic and Partisan Lines



- 18–44-year-old men (66%) and women (70%) equally support keeping abortion legal.
- White (67%), black (69%), and Hispanic (69%) 18–44-year-olds equally favor keeping abortion legal.
- No generation gap among Democrats: 18-44 (84%) and 45+ year old (86%) equally support keeping abortion legal.
- As on other social issues, a generation gap among Republicans: 47% of 18–44-year-old Republicans in contrast to 34% of 45+ Republicans favor keeping abortion legal.
