Dr. Modupe (Mo) Adefeso-Olateju is education policy expert with multisectoral experience in the development sector, and established competencies in evidence-generation, monitoring, evaluation, technical support for scaling up education innovations, policy implementation advisory and the design of public-partnerships. She served on the Ministerial Technical Working Group responsible for developing Nigeria's Medium- and Long-Term Strategic Development Plans (MTNDP 2021-2025, 2026-2030 and Nigeria Agenda 2050) for Education and Human Capital Development. She has been co-convener of the Federal Ministry of Education's annual education conference (NAEC) since 2018, leading the technical design of the meetings. She also drafted a section of the 2011-15 Ministerial Action Plan, and has supported the implementation and scale up of education programming and capacity development in 3 countries. She led the establishment of the LEARNigeria, an innovative citizen-led household assessment and action programme which has reached 49,000 children in 21,600 households in Nigeria, and implements an effective remedial programme in Foundational Literacy and Numeracy. She oversaw the Regional Hub for the Center for Education Innovations (CEI), and leads the implementation of the annual pan-African Education Innovation Summit (NEDIS), now in its 6th year. She also led the team that served as Regional Learning Partner for the Partnership to Strengthen Innovation and Practice in Secondary Education (PSIPSE). She is an experienced fundraiser and has supported programmes funded by UK-FCDO, USAID, Hewlett Foundation, MacArthur Foundation, Global Partnership for Education, World Bank, Global Partnership for Education, Open Society Foundations, Google.org, UNICEF, UNESCO Institute of Statistics, Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and Ford Foundation.
